Honour for ex-Mayors?

THREE former mayors of Rhondda — who are not standing at this year's borough council elections
— may be made Freemen of the Borough.

They are councillors Dan Murphy, T. J. Davies and Richard Newman. Coun. Tom Matthews moved that a special meeting should be held to consider the plan.

He said of Coun. Murphy's decision not to stand: 'The whole council learns this with some regret. Over the last 30 years he's been known throughout the country".

Family fears for Ton man in Spanish jai

THE trial of the Rhondda man being held in a Spanish jail on a drugs charge has been adjourned for two months.

And now it looks as if Alan Jones of Ton Pentre may have to spend almost a year in jail before the outcome is known.

Mr. Jones, aged 36 was arrested on July 11 last year and charged with smuggling 23 kilos of hashish over the Spanish border

Mr. Jones has always said he was innocent and that the drugs were planted on him.

After his arrest, he spent several months at Cueta jail in Spanish Morrocco before being transferred to Cordoba prison on the Spanish mainland.

has transferred back again to Cueta - the scene of an abortive escape bid with some fellow prisoners last autumn which he complained resulted in him being badly beaten up by prison guards.

Back home in the Rhondda. his relatives are increasingly concerned at the latest chain of events.

His brother, Mr. Norman Jones, a ventilation officer at Lewis Merthyr Colliery, is particularly worried because Alan was so badly treated the last time he was in Cueta. And

letters to his lawyer, the prison governor, the British Vice-Consul have all failed to · illict any response as to the reasons behind this latest

The rumours were that he would have to go back to Cueta for his trial as this may be a step in the right direction. But why won't anyone in authority give us some information. Are they afraid?" asks Mr Jones, who lives in Leslie Terrace, Porth

The Rhondda Leader understands that the trial date was originally fixed for March 7. but was adjourned for, perhaps two months, so that a police report could be com-

But, said his brother, "he is now afraid at the present time to release this because he has been transferred back, to Cueta jail where he was originally maltreated".

He is also understandably reluctant to be too open in case it may jeopardise or influence his trial or his treatment

"Alan says that although he has been left alone in Cueta since he was transferred back, there appears to be the stony silence treatment by the guards who recognize him from his previous visit", said:
